

QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER:

- 1. What new words did you learn by reading **Baseball from A to Z**?
- 2. Which position would you most like to play? Why?
- 3. Explain the difference between outfield and infield.
- 4. Which two letters are both types of hits? Which would you rather make?
- 5. Explain why quick releases by the catcher are so important.
- 6. Which illustration is your favorite? Why?
- 7. Why do you think the illustrator picked this palette of colors? Why not pastels?
- 8. Where should a pitch be thrown? Why?
- 9. What is a rookie? Have you ever been a rookie at something?
- 10. Why do you think no hitters are so rare?
- 11. Who is the umpire? Do you think is his job is more important than the pitchers? Why or why not?
- 12. How can you become an Ace reader? What makes a good reader? What makes an ace pitcher?
- 13. Would you rather walk or hit a grounder? Why?
- 14. Do you think teams that play at home usually score more than a visiting team? Why do you think so?
- 15. Who wears a jersey? Does anyone else? Why? What teams are you a fan of?

PROJECTS

Math/Logical:

Draw a diagram of a baseball field and identify all the positions and any other information you learned from the book.

Writing:

Write your own ABC of your favorite sport or hobby.

Reading:

Brainstorm a list of strategies you can use when you come across a word you don't know. Then reread the story and use one of them!

Music:

Sing "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" and raise your hand each time you hear a word from the book.

Art:

Artists use perspective to make their work come to life. They look at several angles (above, below, side) and also how close or far away to draw each figure. Go through the book again but this time note what angle each picture has and whether it is a close-up, mid-field or outfield view. Then draw your own picture of your favorite sport or hobby from at least two views.

Create your own mascot for a team. Be sure he's kid friendly!

Math:

Solve the following word problems:

- 1. The Tigers have hit three homeruns but the Giants just got a grand slam. How many points ahead are the Giants now?
- 2. If three players both score doubles how many points have they made?

- 3. If hot dogs cost \$5.00 a piece and there are four of you that are starving. How much will it cost for each of you to have two hot dogs?
- 4. If five players score singles, 2 players score doubles and one grand slam then what are the points on the board?
- 5. If each player got to bat four times in the game and there are nine players on the team how many times total did the team bat?
